## **PASTOR'S PONDERINGS**

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

New life.

We are currently in the season of spring. Everywhere you look you see it around you. You also feel it in the changing of the weather. I was reminded of spring recently myself.

You see, at our home, we have baskets hanging on the front porch. These hanging baskets (along with a few other areas of our home) are prime real estate so to speak for robins who love to build their nest there. This year has been no different. Several weeks ago, as we sat out on the front porch, we noticed a female robin building a nest then a few weeks later we heard them, the baby birds, mouths opened, longing for a juicy morsel of worm from their parents. And we watched in awe as one of the parents would swoop down, scoop up a worm (from where I do not know) and

fly into the nest and feed the babies. Now, the baby birds have "flown the nest" so to speak. They are still around because they can't fly a lot just yet and you can still see them out on their own, pecking the ground for something to eat.

Why do I share this story with you this month? As I thought about the building of the nest, the laying of the robin blue eggs, and the birth of the babies, I was reminded that May brings with it the divine announcement of new life.

It does so first because we are still in the season of Easter. Yes, easter is not just a one day event. Rather, for us, it lasts eight (weeks) from the Sunday that we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and lasts until June 8 when we will celebrate Pentecost. Praise the Lord that we get to celebrate this most glorious season all these weeks.

But what does Easter have to do with new life? Another good question. Folks, Easter reminds us of the new life that we are given when Jesus stepped out of the tomb on that first Easter morning. In death, your sins were put to death. In burial, you were asleep with Him, and His resurrection is your resurrection because He lives for you and has overcome death, hell, and the grave. His victory over them tells you that the old Adam that likes to rear it's ugly head is dead, and you are a new creation in the Lord.

Though we celebrate new life on Easter with the resurrection of our Lord, we also physically see it in Holy Baptism. How is that so? Because in baptism, the sins you are born with, that is original sin, and the sins you've committed up until that moment, are washed away in the water combined with the Word of the Lord. For it is God's Word that saves us. The Gospel according to St. Mark tells us, "Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved..." (Mark 16:16). Every time we make the sign of the cross, we are remembering our baptism and the new life that is given to us there.

# HMN FOCUS



#### "We Praise You and Acknowledge You, O God" - LSB 941

Way in the back of the Lutheran Service Book (LSB), in the Biblical Canticles section is a gem of a hymn titled, "We Praise You and Acknowledge You, O God." The hymn is likely new to most of us at Immanuel but certainly is worthy of your attention.

You may be familiar with the term *Te Deum laudamus*, which means simply We Praise You, O God in Latin. The *Te Deum* is a song of praise to God and lists all who are singing and praising God along with the many reasons that we all should do so. Traditionally, the Te Deum is sung during the *Matins* service and you can still find it on page 223 of the LSB. The hymn, LSB 941 takes the wording of the traditional Te Deum and places it in a hymn style, also called a *versification* -- make into verses or stanzas.

For LSB 941, Lutheran hymn writer Rev. Stephen P. Starke (b. 1955) took the words and concepts of the *Te Deum* and rewrote them as poetry to fit a 20<sup>th</sup> century tune. The hymn tune is known as THAXTED. It was composed by Gustav Holst (1874-1934) and is based on a melody from his symphony that was popular in the 1920's. The tune is melodic and a fitting song of praise for such majestic verbiage.

You are invited to join with the Senior Choir during June services to sing and become familiar with "We Praise You and Acknowledge You, O God." - LSB 941.

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to all the delegates who faithfully represented their congregations, as well as to the guests and exhibitors who joined us throughout the week. Your presence, participation, and prayerful discernment were a vital part of this gathering. As we look ahead to the next three years, we are excited to continue our partnership in ministry-supporting one another as churches, schools, and ministries across the district. Together, we move forward in our shared mission: to connect people with Jesus so that lives are transformed and God's kingdom grows.



## SED Convention 2025 Richmond, VA – May 8-9

Notes from Ruth Thomas, Lay Delegate in attendance

- President William Harmon was re-elected as President of the SED.
- Registration 339 present on Friday; 128 lay delegates; 121 pastoral delegates
- LCMS President Matthew Harrison attended and asked for prayers for unity in the Church. He will stand one more time for re-election, then stand down. If not elected, he is okay with that. The travel is getting harder.
- Rev. Lloyd Gaines was re-elected as N. Region VP and 1<sup>st</sup> VP.
- Communion statements are OK to have, but you should always ask visitors to speak to the Pastor.

- Church planting 70 in process (15 in our District); also 25 more in the European Union. More young families and young men are coming to worship. There are 33 million people now living with the SED.
- Each congregation is encouraged to develop at least one new outreach ministry tailored to the needs of its immediate neighborhood (e.g., after-school programs, community gardens, senior care initiatives).
- The SED is encouraging congregations to create opportunities for youth-oriented service projects.
- Costs are up 40%, but the Synod has 120 million in cash or investments, with 60 million of those funds designated.
- Over 1 million was donated for hurricane relief, and all related grants were fully funded.
- Churches with Pastors are asked to sponsor a vacant church and support its congregation. There are still many vacancies.
- There was lively discussion about whether to support hybrid or online educational opportunities for pastoral candidates. The consensus was that residential programs are best, although Specific Ministry Pastors are taking advantage of the online offerings.
- Recruitment is challenging, and it was resolved to set a goal for each congregation of having at least one person, every three years, commit to and start training in a church work vocation. I asked President Harrison whether the LCMS was doing enough through digital ads and podcasts toward recruitment. He paused and said, No, not enough. He said he would do better to reach younger men through these methods.
- There were multiple Resolutions passed regarding Wellness for church workers. Every congregation is encouraged to establish a Congregational Church Worker Wellness Team. The SED will provide guidance and training. Congregations are also encouraged to participate in completing the SIMPLE Congregational Well-Being Assessment to evaluate and enhance their ministry wellness.
- Congregations are encouraged to establish a formal sabbatical policy with available resources from the SED (not sure whether that means funding or just examples).
- Foundation grants of \$5,000 for church workers will be a future offering.

When we completely trust in God for guidance and peace, he not only sees us through difficult times but allows us to rejoice rather than worry.
